Upon return from Latin America, Joy continued writing plays and began working as a teaching artist for regional theaters in San Diego and then Seattle, where she has lived for the last eighteen years. She has taught playwriting for San Diego's Old Globe Theater and La Jolla Playhouse, and Seattle's ACT Theater. As a playwright, her work has been developed and produced in San Diego, Chicago, New York, and Seattle. Most recently, her plays *Blood Water Paint* (2019) and *Smoke & Dust* (2018) were produced by Macha Theatre Works, both under the direction of Amy Poisson. Joy's young adult novel *Blood Water Paint* (Dutton/Penguin) is an adaptation of her own original play.
